CAREER EXPERIENCE

I graduated in medicine from Sheffield University in 1972 winning various distinction and prizes. I initially embarked on a surgical career holding posts in various surgical specialities for seven years and obtaining the F.R.C.S examination of England and Edinburgh without much difficulty. However in 1979 because of the then medical manpower situation I opted to change career direction and entered General Practice in South Yorkshire. I joined a three partner practice in Rotherham which at that time had less than 4,000 patients. Within three years I was the practice's senior partner and by the time I retired from NHS General Practice in 2006 (not for health reasons but rather to pursue medico-legal work) the practice had 12,000 patients and operated three surgeries.

I have been retained by South Yorkshire Police as a Forensic Physician from 1983 to September 2009. My duties have involved dealing with medical problems (principally injuries, drugs, alcohol and mental health problems) of prisoners in cells at Doncaster Police Station (which has one of the busiest custody suites in the country), examination of intoxicated drivers, examination of injuries, examination of corpses, examination of sexual assault victims (adults and children) and perpetrators. I have worked a 1 in 3 rota for 27 years and saw an average of 12-15 individuals per 24 hour shift. Consequently I consider I have a wealth of experience as a Forensic Physician.

During the past eight years I have been instructed by solicitors to examine in excess of around 7,000 individuals who are pursuing personal injury claims in relation to relatively minor road accidents

usually involving neck and back injuries and psychological upset and for each individual have written a report to assist the court in coming to a fair and just decision. I consider my experience as a hospital doctor and NHS General Practitioner has left me in an ideal position to assess such claimants' various physical and psychological symptoms and to give a reasoned prognosis. Although none of their claims have necessitated my appearing in court I have been in the witness box on average four or five times a year during my 27 years as a Forensic Physician contracted to South Yorkshire Police. I do consider myself experienced and sufficiently qualified to be considered an expert in the fields of forensic medicine and minor injuries litigation. I have attended legal report writing/expert witness seminars run by solicitors and barristers. I have also acted as a Defence Expert on many occasions and would consider myself very adequately experienced in pointing out the medical flaws in the prosecutions medical evidence in non-capital cases. I have also done occasional reports for medical negligence cases involving Family Physicians.

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
